## MILTON HAZELTON LANGFORD

Milton Hazelton Langford, the son of Benjamin Langford and Patsy Pace, (link <a href="https://freepages.rootsweb.com/~jblaney/genealogy/langford.html">https://freepages.rootsweb.com/~jblaney/genealogy/langford.html</a>) was born February 27, 1815 in Greenville County, South Carolina. He moved west with his family through Jackson County, Alabama (1819); Crawford County, Arkansas (1829); and Pope County, Arkansas (1830). By 1837 he was in Fannin County, Republic of Texas, where he applied for a land grant and having complied with the requirements, received 640 acres. Later in 1841, the War Department of the Republic of Texas issued him a promissory note for horses sold, for a total of \$810.

M. H. married Mary Ann "Polly" Banta, daughter of Isaac William Banta and Elizabeth Barker, in Lamar County, Texas on June 22, 1843. Records show that he cosigned the first bond recorded after the organization of Hunt County, Texas. His father-in-law, Isaac Banta, was one of the county founders. During the Civil War, in 1864, after three of their children succumbed to smallpox, M. H. and Polly moved south with their family in search of a less populated area and better grazing land for their livestock. They found plenty of grass and water on the Seco, but the Indians became so troublesome they could not keep horses to tend the stock. The family finally settled in Bandera for protection and school purposes. Altogether they had 10 children: Martha Evelyn (November 22, 1845-April 30, 1922), Benjamin Franklin (September 10, 1847-February 28, 1923), John D. (August 8, 1849-February 14, 1898), Isaac Berry (June 1, 1851-March 7, 1914), Sinai W. (July 10, 1854-July 2, 1863), Alfred W. (March 20, 1856-August 15, 1863), Andrew E. (April 8, 1858-July 4, 1863), Eliza Langford (June 8, 1860-December 31, 1928), Lee Wilson (August 5, 1863-October 1, 1926), and James Monroe (December 19, 1865-November 9, 1953). M. H. Langford was concerned with law and order and filled a two year term as Sheriff of Bandera County beginning in 1868 with a salary of \$25.00/year. His wife, Polly, died on June 27, 1870. She was buried in the Bandera Cemetery, one of the first to be buried there.

In 1872, M. H. married Martha Ann Rowland Cryer in Medina County, Texas. The family, except for Benjamin Franklin Langford and Isaac Berry Langford who remained in Bandera, moved to a ranch on the Dry Frio, in the old Tehuacana Community in Frio County, Texas. M. H. and Martha Ann had two children: Milton Madison (December 20, 1873-December 13, 1943) and Mary O. (May 17, 1876-July 13, 1935). M. H. helped organize the Tehuacana Community giving property and building to the Methodist Episcopal Church South for a church and a school. He also served as a school trustee from 1877-1884. After Martha Ann died in the Tehuacana Community on 11 July, 1893, M. H. returned to Bandera. He died on October 30, 1898 and is buried in the Bandera Cemetery.
